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Songkran is an annual holiday that's celebrated on the 13th of April in the country of Thailand. The purpose of this holiday is to celebrate the Thai New Year by washing away one's sins by soaking each other's bodies to cleanse the spirit, which is thought to symbolize washing away the previous year's bad luck.

On the 4th of April 2025, IPS celebrated the annual holiday just before the long awaited break. The event took over half the day and was full of many exciting performances as well as the iconic Mini-market hosted by students, and of course the highly anticipated water fights later in the afternoon.

The celebration commenced with many performances by multiple students, beginning with an energetic and entertaining dance from Keystage 1 students. Afterwards, select students from Keystage 2 would perform another traditional inspired dance, this time featuring hand-made versions of the instrument known as a "พิณ", a lute shaped instrument with 3 strings and a pear-shaped base. The Keystage 3-5 would soon join in on the performances, featuring many more traditional Thai dances and even a violin solo!

After the dance performances concluded, students ranging from K1 to Year 13, including all SRC members, poured water on the hands of teachers in a ceremonial practice called 'รดน้ำดำหัว', a traditional ritual that is seen as a show of respect to elders.

Following this, the Thai Mini Market was open to students, teachers, and parents. It consisted of Thai snacks, drinks and desserts sold by IPS students. Some game booths were also installed as part of the event by the Keystage 5 students, where everyone had multiple choices of entertaining games ranging from a "What's in the box" game to a classic shooting can game.

The event concluded at 10:45 am, and students resumed their regular classes. The celebrations resumed later after lunch, in which students threw water at each other in water fights. Students were armed with toy water guns and also participated in the IPS-famous game, Sponge-the-Teacher. Overall, the Songkran festival was a huge success for the IPS community and an educational experience for everyone.

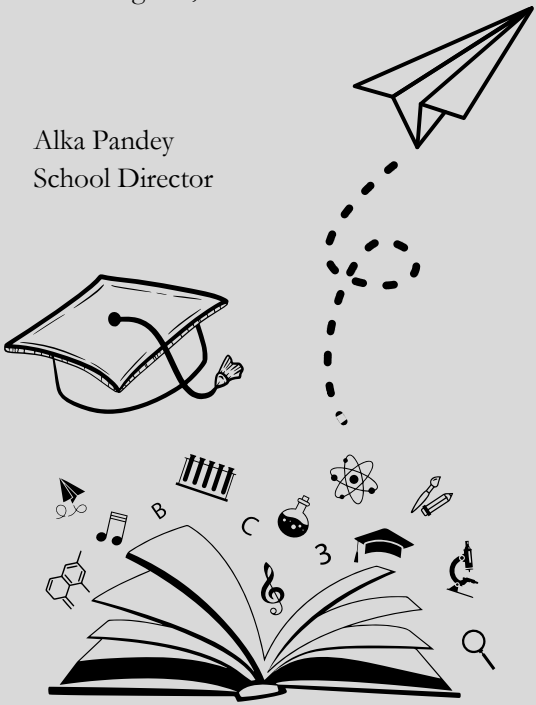

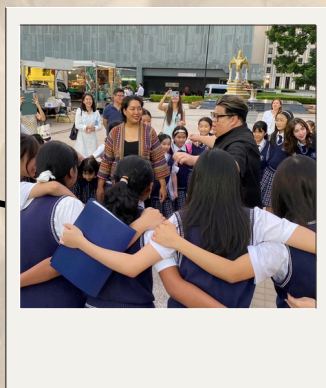
To the leadership team—thank you for believing in the arts and allowing our program to grow. For giving me the space to create, to fail, to start again, and to lead with heart.

What should've been a typical Friday afternoon would end in fear and uncertainty on March 28, 2025. A 7.7 magnitude earthquake would strike at the heart of Myanmar, causing significant damage to infrastructure and the loss of several lives in the country. While Myanmar would witness the full effect of the earthquake, other neighbouring countries, including China and Vietnam, would also be affected by the tremors caused by the quake. One of the affected countries was the neighbouring country of Thailand, which would also be affected by the earthquake.

The earthquake occurred at 12:50 PM MMT, striking the Sagaing region of Myanmar. The earthquake's epicenter was located close to Mandalay City, the second largest city in Myanmar, just after Yangon. The quake would reach an unimaginable magnitude of 7.7-7.9 on the Richter scale. The 2025 earthquake proved to be the most powerful earthquake to strike Myanmar ever since 1912 and the second deadliest in Myanmar's modern history, surpassed only by the 1930 Bago earthquake. Major cities such as Mandalay, Sagaing, Nay Pyi Taw, Bago, Magway, and Shan State were severely affected by the devastation, with many infrastructures being destroyed and reduced to rubble. By the time the dust had settled, over 5000 fatalities were confirmed by the Myanmar government.

While most of the capital of Bangkok remained relatively untouched with a few minuscule amounts of damage, a still-under-construction building intended for the State Audit Office located at Kamphaeng Road collapsed when the earthquake struck, causing 92 confirmed deaths of workers who were in the building at the time. The skyscraper was the only building affected by the earthquake in Thailand, and the collapse was one of the deadliest single instances of structural failure in

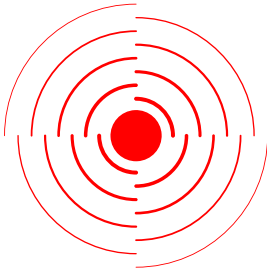
Thailand's history. A later investigation found that the quality of the steel used to construct the building was of questionable quality, as Industry Minister Akanat Promphan said at an on-site news conference that "anomalies" had been found in the steel and samples taken. The company responsible for the construction of the building, China Railway No.10 Engineering Group, were found to have used steel bars from the Chinese company Xin Ke Yuan Steel, which was found to be inadequate at holding up the structure during a natural disaster. The cause of the collapse was later determined to be a mixture of insufficient construction materials and soft, unstable ground where the foundation of the construction site was located.

However, the earthquake scare did not end on the same day as the earthquake itself. Three days later, on March 31, residents of the Master Sathorn Executive apartment, as well as workers in the Sinn Sathorn Tower located in Krung Thon Buri, were once again forced to evacuate the area as the Sinn Sathorn Tower was discovered to be tilting towards the residential area. Thankfully, the tower didn't collapse onto the nearby apartment building, yet the effects of the earthquake still left a permanent impression on the residents of Master Sathorn Executive.

While the earthquake only lasted for a few minutes, the effects it caused on the countries of Myanmar and Thailand are still felt to this day. Over 5000 lives were lost in Myanmar and another 100 in Thailand as a result of the earthquake. Yet, despite the tragedy, humanity continues to move forward no matter the cost. The International Pioneers School community would like to send their most sincere condolences to all victims, families, and relatives.

EARTHQUAKE STROKED MANDALAY

On May 1st 2025, thousands of Thai workers gathered at Lan Khon Mueang Square during Labor Day to celebrate workers' contributions and to demand real change. Colourful booths and cultural performances set the scene, but the spotlight was on labour leaders calling for better protections, fair pay, and job security. Labor Day is an annual event where the contribution of workers of the country who helped with the nation's economy is recognized. The very first Labor Day was celebrated in New York City on Tuesday, September 5, 1882. By 1884, over 23 more states had adopted the national holiday, which led to President Grover Cleveland signing a law making the first Monday in September of each year Labor Day on June 28, 1884. In 1972, Thailand would officially recognize Labor Day as a national holiday, and it's now observed by both the Bank of Thailand as well as several private sectors.

The heart of this potent rally was the ardent call for reform; a resonant plea for enhanced protections and equitable treatment for workers across the kingdom. With unwavering determination, the marchers proudly wielded signs and banners, underscoring pressing labor issues like equitable wage adjustments and fair compensation during maternity leave. "This is not just about today," said Panus Thailuan, president of the National Congress of Thai Labour. "It's about fairness every day. It's about dignity." The relay of workers would raise awareness on several worker welfare systems, including Health and Safety of the workers as well as Workplace Safety. Among the nine demands presented

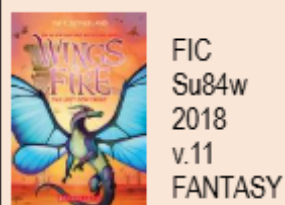
were calls for a national risk insurance fund and stronger laws against unpaid layoffs. In a notable engagement between the Thai government and civilians, Labour Minister Phiphat Ratchakitprakarn graciously received these pivotal proposals. While the mood remained peaceful, the message from Thai workers was loud and clear: respect our rights, or hear from us again next May.

Understanding AS and A Levels at IPS

Subject Choices

Every year, Year 12 and Year 13 students take AS and A level examinations. Students are required to choose a minimum of 3 and a maximum of 4 subjects. Usually, students focus on 3 because it is less stressful and easier to manage time. IPS offers 13 subjects in total. The subjects offered include Computer Science, Mathematics, Statistics, Mechanics, Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Business, Economics, Accounting, English, Psychology and Global Perspectives & Research. However, Global Perspectives & Research is only offered in A levels. If students wish to take this subject, studying English at AS level is compulsory. Moreover, if Mathematics is chosen, students must also take either Mechanics or Statistics. Mechanics and Accounting are the least popular choices this school year. Only 3 students take Mechanics and 5 students take Accounting. Mathematics is known to be the most popular choice this year. Only 5 students don't take Maths.

Compulsory subjects

In addition to chosen subjects, all students must study Overseas and Local Career Counseling, Thai, PSHE, PE and Community Service classes. Also, every week, students have to do a 45-minute internship, where they help with kids' library classes or ICT classes. Community service of 24 hours must be completed by the end of the school year. This is usually done by opening stalls during school events. During career counseling classes, Teacher Ann and Teacher MeeZ will prepare the students for university and provide them with options for their future. Additionally, to ensure that students don't forget their Thai culture, there would be Thai classes thrice a week, where students learn about cultures and traditions. This is taught by Teacher Sa.

Exam Boards and Internal Curriculum

Most subjects follow the Pearson Edexcel exam board, while Psychology, Computer Science, and English use the Cambridge (CIE) board. IPS offers an internal curriculum for students who didn't pass their IGCSEs. Instead of external exams, final scores are based on classwork and term grades.

My personal experience and advice

For my subject choices, I chose Accounting, Economics and Business. This is because I'm more interested in the field of Finance. The syllabus is tough and quite lengthy, but I've received support from Teacher Ali, Teacher Freddie and Teacher Moses. For those who plan to take similar subjects as me, I advise you to manage your time wisely, especially when answering the papers. Finishing on time is one of the biggest challenges I faced. Make sure to practice the past papers, memorize the theory and don't procrastinate. Start preparing yourself early on because it takes a lot of time to go through the syllabus. Overall, it can be intense but with practice, it's definitely manageable.

To remind and promote the importance of health and well-being to the IPS community, as well as to instill a sense of community service among the students, the IPS' Years 12 and 13 were delighted to exclusively take part in the organizing process for the health event "IPS Fun Run 2025: Wave 7." IPS Fun Run is a fundraising event that was designed to encourage unity and active community involvement among the students in the valued IPS community, which was held at Thailand's first public park — Lumpini Park, for the seventh wave on the morning of Sunday 23rd March 2025. Therefore, Key Stage 5 students (Y12-Y13) were assigned to different roles and responsibilities — in order to ensure the participants' safety and the flow throughout the event.

The time of registration started at 6 o'clock in the morning, yet all the

Next, Harshit and Aarush from Y13 were then welcomed to lead the warm up through some dynamic stretches and exercises. They were indeed amazingly energetic despite the early morning time!

7 a.m., after the fun and exciting warm-up, the participants were finally getting ready for the run. To ensure the directions and the guidelines were followed, there were student staff along the track to guide them. Still, the event must come to an end regardless. The parents and the students were enjoying the morning run in the 142-acre large and beautiful Lumpini park along with the assistance of the student staff team to ensure their safety until they didn't realize how fast time flies. The event has later on reached the time for the awarding ceremony for the following winners in the time of 9 a.m, which was the last part of the IPS Fun Run: Wave 7 event.

This year's Art and Music Day was not just an event - it was a joyful celebration of creativity, talent, and togetherness. Here's to many more moments like this!

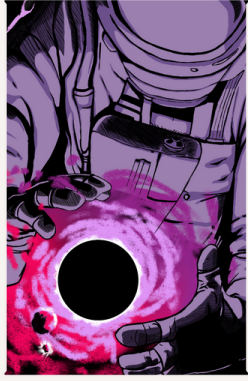
